Young baseball lover scores another dream afternoon

Urbana Highlands' little celebrity Dillon Papier, 4, recently enjoyed a day on the Bowie Baysox field, a place his parents say he feels at home with the umpires, players and coaches.

Dillon's grandmother, Maris Walker, organized the April 29 benefit at the Baysox stadium to raise funds and awareness of Dillon's condition, a fatal disease called Niemann-Pick. Dillon is one of roughly 500 people diagnosed with the genetic disease, which slowly affects the motor system and has no known cure.

Dillon hung out in the dugout, chatted with players and delivered the starting line-ups to umpires before throwing the first pitch of the game to Baysox catcher Ryan Hubele, his mother, Darrile Papier, said. Hubele presented a bat signed by all of the players to Dillon, who still has the glove from the catcher he received last year.

The annual benefit event, which doubles as a birthday celebration for Dillon, who will turn 5 in August, drew 260 family and friends last year, including Dillon's father, Mark, a baseball coach at Gov. Thomas Johnson

High School.

"We are still overwhelmed with the generosity and support we continue to receive toward Dillon's fight for a cure," Darrile Papier said in an e-mail. "It truly gives us the strength and encouragement knowing we are not alone in our struggle."

In February, the youngster and his parents enjoyed another day in the baseball spotlight as they joined the Baltimore Orioles in Florida for spring training. Several Urbana Highlands neighbors organized and funded the trip and surprised the family with the mini-vacation at a Christmas community gathering.

In Florida, Dillon spent time with Orioles player Brian Roberts, who gave him a signed bat and met Orioles Florida operations manager Laura

Williams and received a hug. baseball hat and a bag of Orioles mementos from her. The baseball fan continues to remember his excitement through videos and photos of the day, his mother said.

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for sending Dillon on a dream vacation."
